IN MEMORIAM

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of two long-time and especially active NCLA members.

E. Marie Doran was an individual who gave tirelessly of herself to NCLA. Not only was she an active division member, but she made sure that others were members of the Association as well. Her annual membership renewal would include a gift membership to least 3 or 4 other individuals who she felt could benefit from membership. In addition, she was a generous contributor to our scholarship and education grant programs. We send our sincere condolences to her longtime partner, (and NCLA member) Louis Decker, and wish him our best at this difficult time.

Marie worked full-time at the Uniondale Public Library from 1993 until she retired in 2010. Prior to that, Marie worked at the Peninsula Public Library from 1972 through 1993, and she also served as a library trustee after she left employment there until 2010.



Last year, at this time, I was advising the membership that our 1991 president, **Adah Silberg**, had re-located to Chevy Chase, MD. I am sorry to report that Adah passed away on May 9, 2017. In alerting the membership to this passing, I tried to convey an appreciation for how special this woman was to the Association and the profession. Adah took up the mantle of librarianship later in

her life. She earned her baccalaureate and MLS after losing her husband of 26 years. However, she certainly made the most of her education. A dedicated and distinguished children's librarian, she touched many youngsters in the community with her love and attention to their needs. Her talents of leadership were recognized in the acceptance of the Directorship of the Peninsula Public Library and the presidency of NCLA. Even in retirement, she was a devoted member of NCLA and contributed annually to our scholarship program as she moved to New Jersey and then to Maryland to be near her son, his wife, but especially her grandson, Jake.

We understand that there will be a memorial service for Adah in a few weeks, however, at this time we want to extend our deepest sympathies and condolences to her son, William (Bill) and all the members of her family.

We also can think of no better way to honor Adah's memory than by encouraging those who are able to support her two favorite causes - literacy and early child education - through donations in her name to the Peninsula Public Library (280 Central Ave., Lawrence, NY, 11559), or the Early Learning Center (112 Wahl Ave, Inwood, NY 11096). Donations to the Library will go to a new building capital campaign, while donations to the Early Learning Center will go to direct service programming.

**Presentation of the 2017 LDA Award for Excellence in Library Achievement
at the
42nd Annual Long Island Library Conference**

For more than 20 years, it has been my honor to do the presentation of the LDA Award to a deserving member of the Long Island Library community. To begin this year's event, I offer, on behalf of LDA Publishers and the Nassau and Suffolk County Library Associations, a thank you to the members of this year's bi-county award committee for their work in soliciting nominations and selecting a nominee. The committee was co-chaired by Paula Bornstein of the Lindenhurst Memorial Library and Marcia Olsen of the Levittown Public Library.

In 1977, Mr. Andrew Ippolito, a past-president of NCLA, former Director of the Merrick and Lindenhurst libraries, founder of LDA Publishers, and Director of the Newsday Library, created the LDA Award for Excellence in Library Achievement to call attention to the importance of libraries and those who provide a special value to the libraries of Long Island. The award criteria are published in the Directory of Long Island Libraries and Media Centers. of our honoree's extensive years of distinguished service in the advancement of libraries and librarianship.

As I read through the nominating materials, four thoughts struck me in describing this individual - future-thinking, strong and intelligent advocate, innovator, and mentor. The honoree has also been firmly committed to what I call the 4 "Cs" of librarianship - collaboration, cooperation, communication, and community.

Those of us who earned our MLS degree in the 1980's or earlier, were firmly convinced that the world of print reference materials would ground our work. While Dialog® was an expensive entry into the world of electronic resources, it had limited applicability due to its steep learning curve and high costs. Seeing the potential of electronics and relational databases, this leader started to put the library's financial resources into the purchase of CD-ROM databases while cancelling the hard copy resources on which they were based. The vision that this represented has been borne out over time, even as those CD-ROMs morphed into fully online databases.

Many of us speak about the need for library advocacy. We talk about speaking "truth to power" and making sure that the positions that would be most beneficial to our organizations were accepted by political leaders. What would we do if we saw a need for major change in the organization of our libraries

and their financial support by the political structure of our community? In a move that has been described as “one of the most courageous acts by a librarian I have seen in my career,” our honoree took on the Town Board to propose separating the Library from its control and turning it over to the direct control of the citizenry. The largest public library district on Long Island was eventually endorsed by public referendum and that Library has seen major expansion to provide its community with outstanding library service. This model has now been replicated around New York State.

It must be noted that the “C” of collaboration, community and communication were necessary components of this change as community coalitions were built, collaboration with governmental and business organizations were formed, and constant communication was essential.

A few short years ago, Super Storm Sandy devastated the Long Island region. Although FEMA was the agency that everyone needed to work with, making the connection between people and their government required insight and expertise. Our leader noted that his library facilities had the resources to permit FEMA to set up shop in the Library. It would provide people with a safe, warm and fully-powered environment. His library would once again take center stage in service to the public!

It is always great when an individual succeeds in their role as innovator and leader, it

is even more important when that individual creates mechanisms for their skills to be incorporated by others. Once again, we honor a library leader who is firmly recognized as a mentor as well. Through his formation of, and service on continuing education committees, he has passed his knowledge on to others. By working with other library administrators and library trustees, he has insured that best practices of organization and professional development are adopted. By using the tools of his Book Jam YouTube channel, blogs, and Facebook, he has spread his important messages to colleagues outside our region as well.

I believe that the nominators have given us a candidate who is very much deserving of being the winner of this year’s LDA Award. It was very clear from reading the letters of support that this year’s library leader has many willing followers.

This individual is a colleague who shares a vision of library service for today and into the future. While he has passed the period when Library Journal will honor him as a Mover and Shaker, he is truly a Long Island Library treasure.

Please join me in congratulating the 2017 LDA Award recipient, iconoclast extraordinaire, an outstanding librarian and library leader and someone that I believe is also my friend. The Director of the Lindenhurst Memorial Library


LIBRARY BRIEFS


