## Public Library Administrators Certificate Program Fall 2006

SCLS is partnering with the Palmer Institute of Public Library Organization and Management to offer the Public Library Administrator's Certificate Program to regional library managers and other interested library staff at a reasonable cost.

This certificate program is a five course, fifteen-credit graduate level comprehensive management training program for public library administrators that will lead to an Advanced Certificate in Public Library Administration recognized by the New York State Education Department.

The challenges facing today's public library administrators require a solid foundation of training and experience. The Public Library Administrator's Certificate Program is designed to develop and enhance the management skills and credentials of professional librarians working within the public library sector, and to train the leaders of tomorrow.

Each course will be offered in 13-14 two-hour sessions on Tuesday evenings at a regional public library located as conveniently as possible to the majority of participants.

The courses will be offered in this order:

1. Principles of Public Library Organization and Management (LIS 700)
2. Legal Issues and the Regulatory/Governance Environment of the Public Library (LIS 701)
3. Human Resources Administration in the Public Library (LIS 702)
4. Financial Management of Public Libraries (LIS 703)
5. Public Library Facilities, Automated Systems and Telecommunications (LIS 704)

### Instructor:

Jerry Nichols (Director of Palmer Institute for Public Library Organization & Management) is the primary instructor for the program. Numerous guest lecturers and subject experts will assist in the provision of the program.

### Cost:

The cost for each course will be determined by the number of participants. At this time it is estimated to cost between \$800 - \$1,000 for each three credit course.

### FAQ's:

- What credits will I receive?  
These are accredited graduate courses. You will receive three credits upon the completion of each course from Long Island University. You will receive a New York State Education Department Advanced Certificate in Public Library Administration from LIU upon completion of the full program.

- Do I need an MLS?

Yes. The courses are designed for working professionals who either hold or aspire to executive management positions in public libraries. At

least two years professional experience is recommended.

- Will the certificate program give me civil service credit?  
The certificate program covers all content areas required by the NYS Civil Service Public Library Director examination series, and fulfills the administrative training component of the test for candidates without a second masters degree in business or public administration.

- How long has the program been offered?  
The program has been offered in the Long Island region for the past 10 years. Many of our region's top library administrators have graduated from the program.

- How long will it take to complete the five courses?  
One course will be offered each semester, not including summer. Typically the five courses take 2 1/2 years to complete.

- Do I need to take all five of the courses?  
Completion of all five courses is necessary to receive the Advanced Certificate in Public Library Administration. Preference is given to applicants that will be taking the whole program though students are not required to commit to all five courses.


This program of the Library & Information Technology Association (LITA) is intended for librarians, administrators, and computer professionals at institutions with an IR project under consideration or in early stages of development. The material will be oriented to an audience from academic and research institutions because current IR use is most prevalent at those organizations. Hospitals, corporations, and schools can also benefit from the principles and procedures presented here.

The program is presented by Susan Gibbons, Assistant Dean of Public Services and Collection Development at the River Campus Libraries, University of Rochester. She has been involved in the University of Rochester's IR project since 2000, and is the co-principal investigator of an IMLS grant to better understand how an IR can fit into the current work practice of faculty from different disciplines.

Early bird registration fee (by July 20 is \$40 for members; \$100 for non-members. After

July 20, the fee is \$65 for members; \$130 for non-members. Continental breakfast and lunch are included.





## Senior Advocacy For Employees (S.A.F.E.)

Family caregiving is the bedrock upon which this country's healthcare system depends. The services provided by family caregivers represent 80% of all home care services and are conservatively valued at \$257 billion a year, more than twice the amount spent on paid home care and nursing home services combined.

Family caregivers provide a vast array of emotional, financial, nursing, social, homemaking, and other services on a daily or intermittent basis.

As a caregiver, you may feel you have little control over your circumstances, but the opposite is true. You have several rights. It's important to keep these in mind when caregiving becomes overwhelming and you feel frustrated or out of control.

Cynthia Powers at the Bristol Assisted Living Center reminds us that we must take care of ourselves when caregiving and she offers these tips:

- When you are a caregiver, finding time for positive, nurturing interactions with others might seem impossible. But you owe it to yourself to find time for you. Without it, you may not have the mental strength to deal with all of the emotions you experience as a caregiver, including guilt and anger. Give yourself permission not to be perfect...you're doing the best you can.
- Incorporate activities that give you pleasure even when you don't

really feel like it. Listen to music, work in the garden, engage in a hobby...whatever it is that you enjoy.

- Pamper yourself. Take a warm bath and light candles. Find some time for a manicure or a massage.
- Eat balanced meals to nurture your body. Find time to exercise even if it's a short walk everyday. Do the best you can to sleep at least 7 hours a night.
- "Laughter is the best medicine"...buy a light-hearted book or rent a comedy video. Whenever you can, try to find some humor in everyday situations.
- Keep a journal. Write down your thoughts and feelings. This helps provide perspective on your situation and serves as an important release for your emotions.
- Arrange a telephone contact with a family member, a friend, or a volunteer from a church or senior center so that someone calls each day to be sure everything is all right. This person could relieve you of responsibility by contacting other family members to let them know the status of the care receiver or if you need anything.
- Try to set a time for afternoons or evenings out. Seek out friends and family to help you so that you can have some time away from the home. And, if it is difficult to leave, invite friends and family over to visit with you. Share some tea, or coffee. It is important that you interact with others.
- Join a support group. Seek out people who are going through the same experiences that you are living each day. If you can't leave the house, many Internet services are available
- Draw strength from your faith, or any faith-based caregiving support services. A congregation in a church or synagogue can provide the encouragement you need to feel good about your caregiving role, and may also be able to provide a break from time to time.
