PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

This time last year, I was thinking about the future of NCLA and what the Executive Board's focus might be for upcoming 12 months. The list was long! One area, though, stood out: membership. NCLA is only as strong as our members, and one of the keys to our ongoing success is an active, informed, and engaged membership.

We started the year in a very good place, in terms of membership. This was due largely to the Herculean efforts of our Membership Chairperson. Art Friedman. Art's knowledge and leadership is invaluable in so many areas of NCLA, but maybe nowhere as much membership. Almost singlehandedly, he has maintained our records, sends welcome letters to new and renewing members, collects dues, and constantly updates our printed roster of members (to name just a few of his responsibilities). It is no small task to accomplish all this and there simply aren't enough superlatives to heap upon Art for all that he does.



As Vice President James Hutter and I compared notes about where we wanted NCLA to go this year, and how we hoped to lead it there, we realized that continuing to strengthen our membership was essential. It also became clear that innovations in how we handle membership could help NCLA grow, evolve, and better serve Nassau County library workers.

To find out where we should concentrate our efforts in updating membership policies and procedures, we members and non-members alike for input. The survey we sent out this past spring asked folks to weigh in on a number of aspects of membership - from methods for joining/renewing to the relative value of our dues. The feedback we received thoughtful and varied, but. overwhelmingly, respondents told us that the ability to manage membership online and pay dues electronically was of paramount importance.

Well, I'm happy to report, that the NCLA Executive Board has now acted upon those comments. At our November board meeting, we voted to move ahead with adopting Wild Apricot, the membership platform that we have been looking into these past few months.



Wild Apricot will provide users with an easy, electronic avenue for managing memberships. As we launch this new platform, here's a peek at what it can provide:

- A fully automated and customized application process that is webbased and mobile-friendly
- Immediate membership confirmation and renewal notification
- Safe and secure credit card payment options
- The capacity for members to check their membership status at any time
- Automatic renewal (for those who want it)
- Protection of Executive Officer, Division Officer, Committee Chairperson, and general membership contact information

Of course, none of these changes are going to happen overnight. As James assumes the NCLA presidency, NCLA will begin to slowly roll out Wild Apricot. And rest assured that, should you not wish to take advantage of online membership options, NCLA will still be accepting paper membership forms and payment by check, just as we have always done.




