**c. Civil Service – Ken Bellafiore**

- i. MLD/NCLA Civil Service Representative Group met with Martha Krisel and several staff members of the Nassau County Civil Service Commission on Thursday, October 10, 2019.
- ii. After introductions, it was announced that Debbie Welt was just promoted to Deputy Executive Director of NCCSC.
- iii. Many topics were discussed, including:
  - 1) The institution of e-mail canvassing of lists – Procedures are still in the works, with questions about valid e-mails, legality of e-mails, and documentation requirements.
  - 2) Separate P/T vs. F/T canvass lists – Librarians who take P/T positions can request to be reinstated to a list, but this is not true for clerks. NCCSC gave little hope that separate lists were possible.
  - 3) Recanvassing Procedures – Libraries have received different answers about re-canvassing lists so NCCSC agreed to prepare clear guidelines for re-canvassing.
  - 4) Need for Clerks vs. Clerk-Typists – Although typing is not needed by most library circulation staff, it will continue to be tested by NCCSC because other county municipalities still need typing and Civil Service is streamlining titles and plans to institute a new title, Office Service Assistant I, instead of Clerk-Typist.
  - 5) The need for a streamlined promotional process – There was extensive discussion about promotional paths, pro-active requests for lists in advance of openings, and provisional appointments until a promotional appointment can be made.
  - 6) The current Librarian II list expires at the end of 2020, so NCCSC probably will not open a new exam for Librarian II until the middle of 2020.

7) Results of the New York State examinations for Library Director, Assistant Director, promotional Librarian III, and promotional Librarian II will probably be announced shortly. Results of the Librarian I examination will take longer to announce since more people took that exam. There was extended and heated discussion about NCLA's workshops on the Librarian I examination and completing the online application. This topic will need further discussion.

8) E-mail Transmission of Templates for Staff Rosters – Instructions to send staff rosters with complete social security numbers without encryption via e-mail was question. Martha Krisel informed the group that the IT Department has developed a work-around by setting up secure FTP transmission for municipalities.

- iv. A discussion about civil services reaction to the information sessions ensued. Civil service was very upset about the hosting of these sessions and had numerous issues that will need to be addressed. These information sessions will be revisited with NCLA.
